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Top Do you know OMRI?

OMRI is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that protects organic integrity through verification and education.

**2 OMRI does not create standards,** but works to ensure accurate implementation of the official organic standards in the U.S., Canada and Mexico. OMRI does not take a position or lobby for any materials or standards.

3 OMRI can review products to the USDA organic regulations, the Canadian Organic Standards and/or the Mexico Organic Products Law. The standards for input products vary between ruling bodies.

**4** OMRI listing is completely voluntary. Product manufacturers from around the world choose OMRI as the gold standard for input review.

5 OMRI Listed products meet the standards for use in food production, but the organic standards do not specifically address yard care. Some products are not intended for a home garden.

**O OMRI does not allow any prohibited ingredients** in a final product. OMRI has never allowed sewage sludge as an ingredient.

OMRI conducts some testing to verify ingredients, but does not evaluate safety or efficacy, or perform research on product uses.

8 OMRI works closely with certifiers and operates similarly, but OMRI is not a certifier. Only food and fiber products can be "certified organic."

**9 OMRI Listed products often have "use restrictions,"** meaning they can only be used under certain circumstances when following the organic standards. Restrictions are not usually reflected on the product label, but are included in the *OMRI Products List®* and enforced by organic certifiers.

**10** Every year, OMRI partners with organizations around the world to provide presentations and training, and to answer technical questions on organic standards for inputs.

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
